Ensuring Responsible Spending of Recovery Act Funds

Funding available under the Recovery Act has clear purposes – to stimulate the economy through measures that modernize the Nation's infrastructure, improve energy efficiency, and expand educational opportunities and access to health care. Water Service Improvement Project: Bartolo Square North Neighborhood Water Utility Pipe Project Phase	This project involves the construction and installment of a new polyvinyl chloride (PVC) water main pipe lines and remove an existing corroded cast iron pipes. Due to the corrosion, water main breaks and leaks occur frequently. These leaks and breaks affect water quality and pressure as well as increase the potential for contamination of the drinking water system. The reduced water quality affects fire-line service to the area in the event of an emergency, but most significantly, main breaks result in a loss of potable water to the residents. Also, corroded cast iron pipes affect the quality of potable water provided to residents. Rust gets in the water and negatively affects the color, odor and turbidity of the water. The water can be discolored, have a metallic odor and can contain suspended solids from the rust. The new PVC water main pipe line is an industrial standard that prevents corrosion and has a greater useful life as compared to the cast iron pipe. PVC water pipe lines will provide residents with improved quality of potable water, improved water distribution and improved fireline service. The estimated project cost for the new water main lines is \$1,400,000. ACTIVITY NARRATIVE

The Reconstruction of the Gloria Court and Colonia Road Back Alley project is committed to adhering to all requirements of the Community Development Block Grant Recovery Grant (CDBG-R). The intent of the project is to award a contract, based on bids, within 120 days from the date when the project and funding are approved. That would allow the project to be under contract by August 2011.

The Current estimated completion date for the project is October 2011. This date will allow for the full expenditure of the CDBG-R funds within the 3-year requirement, and in fact, all funds are expected to be expended by October 2011, ahead of the schedule.

PROJECT NARATIVE

This project involves:

1. The demolition of the 50 years old asphalt pavement and concrete gutters in Gloria Court and adjacent back alleyway between Gloria Court and Marquita Street,

2. And the reconstruction of the Gloria Court and the alleyway with new asphalt pavement and concrete gutters as shown on the plans and as specified in the scope of work.

The alley is a dedicated alley to the City of Oxnard as a right of way to the general public. The Gloria Court is approximately 30'wide by 200' long and the alley is 20' wide by 723' long. Both Gloria Court and the Colonia Road back alley are worn out substantially and have potholes throughout their entire length, making the traffic difficult for the commuters and dangerous to the general public. The reconstruction consists of removal and replacement of concrete gutter and curbsides, and replacement of new asphalt in order to improve and ease the access for the neighborhood residents and to increase the life expectancy of the streets by 15 years. The neighborhood is located in census block group 3202.01 with a low-moderate percentage of 94.5%, thereby eligible for CDBG-R funds.
