Scott Whitney appointed as Oxnard's new police chief, begins duties Sept. 16, 2016

On Tuesday, Aug. 30, 2016, City Manager Greg Nyhoff announced the appointment of Scott Whitney as the City's new police chief. Effective Friday, Sept. 16, 2016, Whitney will replace outgoing Police Chief Jeri Williams who will begin her stint as police chief in Phoenix, Ariz.



Currently serving as one of Oxnard's two assistant city managers, Mr. Whitney is a 25-year veteran of the Oxnard Police Department. "I've learned so much over the past 20 months, and I have a new appreciation for all of the challenges facing the City," said Scott Whitney. "However, public safety is in my blood. It's where my heart is," he said.

"Scott will be our first chief in many decades that was actually born and raised in Oxnard. He went to Ramona and Sierra Linda Elementary Schools, Fremont Junior High School and Oxnard High School. He knows our City, our residents, our challenges and most importantly, our strengths and our opportunities," said City Manager Greg Nyhoff.

State Controller finds that City of Oxnard's independent auditors satisfied federal reporting requirements

California State Controller Betty T. Yee found that the City's independent auditor Eadie and Payne LLP satisfied federal reporting requirements for the 2015 single audit report it completed for the City of Oxnard.

"This is another step toward putting our fiscal house in order," said Oxnard City Manager Greg Nyhoff. "It confirms the steps we've taken to rebuild our foundation, and we will continue our focus on financial recovery and reinvesting in the community," he said.

"Having audited the City of Oxnard's June 2015 records and having issued our reports, we are pleased with the 'no findings noted' letter from the State Controller's Office," said Eden Casareno, Eadie and Payne's partner in charge of government services. "We look forward to beginning the 2016 audit for the City," she said.

Oxnard PAL teams up with Assemblymember Irwin for Back-to-School Resource Fair

Oxnard Police Activities League (PAL) partnered with Assemblymember Jacqui Irwin on Saturday, Aug. 13, 2016, to hold the second annual K-12 Resource Fair at the Oxnard PAL Gym.

The free annual event is an opportunity for Oxnard students in need to receive critical services to help them succeed academically and to engage in dialogue about legislative issues that affect the community. The event featured services that included free health screenings and information about higher education and after-school recreation programs.



Additionally, the Oxnard PAL nonprofit was able to provide more than 500 backpacks to children. The backpacks included essential school supplies, a PAL informational brochure, and a certificate provided by Oxnard Lazy Dog Restaurant for a free child's meal. The K-12 Resource has reached 1,500 people combined in the last two years. Oxnard firefighters receive valuable training while helping other agencies fight wildland fires

As the California drought has continued into its fifth year, the Oxnard Fire Department has provided significant contributions to the battle against the wildfires that have gripped the state. The department has a number of personnel that are qualified to work specialty positions, as well as engines that participate in strike team assignments through the state’s mutual aid system. The department has sent multiple personnel to the following fire incidents: Sherpa, Pine, Sobranes, Sand, Cold, Clayton, Blue Cut and Chimney fires. Oxnard Fire has had as many as 10 personnel assigned to wild land firefighting deployments at a time, while still maintaining operational readiness here in the city.

Oxnard Fire recognizes that mutual aid wildland deployments are the new normal for California and recently received an Assistance to Firefighter grant from FEMA to upgrade all personnel’s personal protective equipment for wildland firefighting as well as provide training on initial attack for all personnel and strike team leader training for all company officers.

The wildland deployments have been a major commitment, involving our personnel being away from the city and their families for up to 3 weeks at a time. However, the deployments have provided numerous positive benefits including invaluable wildland firefighting experience and a greater understanding of incident management. The Fire Department is reimbursed for these services.

ABOUT YOUR UTILITIES SYSTEM **AUGUST 31, 2016**

The water that comes from your tap, the pipes that carry it away and the trucks that collect curbside trash and recycling are part of Oxnard's utilities system.

The system consists of three divisions: Water, Wastewater and Environmental Resources (also known as Solid Waste). This trio of services is vital to the well-being of our City and its residents. Here's why:

-  The Water utility delivers drinking water that has been tested and treated to meet rigorous health and safety standards. The division ensures supplies for fire protection, oversees the recycled water program, promotes conservation and secures new sources of supply.
-  The Wastewater utility collects, treats and disposes of wastewater. This involves maintenance, repair and upgrades on treatment plants and more than 400 miles of sewer lines, as well as flood control and stormwater capture.
-  The Environmental Resources utility oversees trash and recycling collection and disposal for 44,000 customers, businesses and apartment complexes. The division is also responsible for meeting government regulations to divert green waste and other reusable materials from landfills.

WATER BY THE NUMBERS

-  **ONE ACRE-FOOT** is 325,851 GALLONS of water
- And is the equivalent of a **FOOTBALL FIELD**, 1-foot deep
-  And would supply **TWO FAMILIES** in California for **ONE YEAR**
-  **OXNARD RESIDENTS** used **61 GALLONS OF WATER** per person, per day in June 2016
- Compared with the statewide average of **105 GALLONS**

Residents and businesses encouraged to provide input on proposed smoking ordinance

The Oxnard City Council will review a proposed smoking ordinance during its regularly scheduled meeting on Tuesday, Sept. 6, 2016. Businesses and residents are encouraged to attend the meeting to provide their input. This will be the City Council's first reading of the proposed ordinance.

Under the proposed ordinance, smoking (including vaping) would be prohibited in/at:

- Dining areas, including outdoor restaurant patios
- Public events, including farmers markets, festivals, parades, etc.
- Recreational areas, including parks, beaches, trails, etc.
- Service areas, including ATM lines, bus stops, kiosks, etc.
- A reasonable distance (25 feet) from any area where smoking is prohibited
- Inside all facilities owned, leased or controlled by the City

City Hall and many City departments will be closed Monday, Sept. 5, 2016, for Labor Day.


