City of Oxnard receives award from CalRecycle for best public service announcement



The California Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery (CalRecycle) recognized the City of Oxnard with the Best Public Service Announcement (PSA)/Commercial Award for 2016 during a special ceremony in Sacramento on Nov. 3, 2016.

The award gives two thumbs up to the creative work done by City staff on oil recycling PSAs produced by the Environmental Resources Division of the Public Works Department in partnership with the Public Information Division of the City Manager's Office. The PSAs are aimed at do-it-yourselfers who change their own motor oil. The videos convey that used oil poured on the ground or down storm drains can have lasting detrimental effects on the coastal environment, including on the animals that call it home. The City has more than 20 used oil collection centers for residents to safely dispose of motor oil.

Oxnard public housing program rated as high performer by HUD

In September, the Oxnard Housing Authority was informed that its Section 8 Program obtained a high performer rating by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). The improved rating was based on increased lease-up of dwelling units to assist more low-income families in the City of Oxnard. There are approximately 1,700 Section 8 Program housing units under contract with the Housing Authority.

The Housing Authority also owns and administers 666 public housing units. On Oct. 26, 2016, the Housing Authority was informed that its public housing program has also been rated a high performer by HUD. Strong financial management and administration of the program, including use of the capital fund and high



occupancy (98.92%), resulted in a high performance rating. The high performance rating in either program designates the Oxnard Housing Authority as a high performer by HUD.

City of Oxnard awarded \$4.1 million judgment that will go toward street improvements



The Superior Court of California for the County of Ventura awarded a \$4.1 million judgment on Sept. 26, 2016, to the City of Oxnard following a dispute between the City and Southern California Gas Company over the costs of relocating gas lines for the Rice Avenue/Santa Clara Avenue Interchange Improvement project that was completed in 2012.

The Superior Court judgment comes after the California Court of Appeals for the 2nd District in January 2016 reversed the Superior Court's original 2014 ruling to dismiss the City's lawsuit to recover the costs it paid to Southern California Gas Company to relocate the gas lines so that the capital improvement project could proceed.

"This is a big win for the Oxnard community," said Oxnard Public Works Director Dan Rydberg. "We're pleased to be able to use these funds for critical street repairs that will greatly enhance the quality of life for our residents," he said.

Oxnard City Attorney Stephen Fischer thanked the City's project manager Cynthia Daniels for her diligence in documenting project costs, which facilitated the full recovery of the relocation expenses and the City Council's decision to pursue the appeal.

"I would also like to thank the City's litigation counsel, Holly Whatley of Colantuono, Highsmith & Whatley for her excellent work in obtaining a judgment completely in the City's favor," Fischer added. The relocation expenses the City paid to Southern California Gas Company originated from state transportation and federal grants, the street/state gas tax and air pollution, Transportation Development Act (TDA) and capital improvement funds. The \$4.1 million will be reallocated to those funds, which are reserved for street improvement projects only. No money from the general fund was used for the project.

The \$4.1 million judgment includes \$2,587,278 in gas line relocation costs, \$1.3 million in prejudgment interest and \$182,803 in attorney's fees and costs.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Police Department receives \$330,000 grant from California Office of Traffic Safety



The Oxnard Police Department received a \$330,000 grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety (OTS) for a year-long program of special enforcements and public awareness efforts to prevent traffic-related deaths and injuries.

The department will use the funding as part of the City's ongoing commitment to keep our roadways safe and improve the quality of life in our community through both enforcement and education.

The grant will fund activities that include educational presentations, DUI checkpoints, bicycle and pedestrian safety, distracted driving enforcement and much more. OTS grant funding will assist

the department in reducing the total number of collisions, which would result in a reduction in injuries and fatalities.

Funding for this program is from the California Office of Traffic Safety through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.
