


CITY ATTORNEY IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE E

The City Council placed Measure E -- the “City of Oxnard 911 Safety, Medical Response, Financial Recovery and Accountability Measure” – on the November 3, 2020 ballot. Measure E would impose a 1½ cent local transaction and use (sales) tax within the City of Oxnard.

Each year, the money generated by Measure E and the expenditures of those funds would be audited annually by an independent accounting firm as part of the City annual audit. Measure E requires that the City Council discuss the results of the audit at a meeting of the City Council that is open to the public. In addition, the results of the audit are required to be posted on the City’s website.

The Measure E sales tax would be a general tax. All proceeds from the tax would go to the City’s General Fund and would be available for any municipal purpose. To be adopted, Measure E must be approved by a simple majority of the ballots cast in this election.
