INTRODUCTION

The American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARP) appropriated \$5 billion to communities across the U.S. to provide housing, services, and shelter to individuals experiencing homelessness and other vulnerable populations. These funds were allocated by formula to HOME participating Jurisdictions. Funding for this grant must be expended on eligible activities by 2030. This special round of funding is called the "HOME-ARP" program.

HOME-ARP funds can only be expended on eligible activities as listed below:

- The provision of Supportive Services (such as housing counseling, homelessness prevention, childcare, job training, legal services, case management, moving costs, rental applications, and rent assistance)
- Acquisition and Development of Non-Congregate Shelters: Purchase and Development of Non-Congregate Shelter (these structures can remain in use as a non-congregate shelter or can be converted to 1) emergency shelter under the Emergency Solutions Grants (ESG) Program; 2) permanent housing under the Continuum of Care (CoC) Program; or 3) affordable housing under the HOME Program)
- Tenant-Based Rental Assistance (TBRA)
- Production or Preservation of Affordable Housing (such as acquisition and rehabilitation)
- Non-Profit Operating (5% maximum allocation) (may not exceed the greater of 50 percent of the general operating expenses of the organization for that fiscal year)
- Non-Profit Capacity Building (5% maximum allocation) (may not exceed the greater of 50 percent of the general operating expenses of the organization for that fiscal year)
- Administration and Planning for the HOME ARP Program (15% maximum allocation)

HOME-ARP funds must be used primarily to benefit individuals or families from the following qualifying populations:

- Sheltered and unsheltered homeless populations
- Those currently housed populations at the risk of homelessness
- Those fleeing or attempting to flee domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, stalking, or human trafficking
- Other families requiring services, housing assistance, or to prevent homelessness
- Those at greatest risk of housing instability or in unstable housing situations

Through the ARP, HUD allocated \$2.7 million in HOME-ARP funds to the City of Oxnard, with the award pending the completion of the planning process. The process included required planning, community and stakeholder consultation, and a gap analysis. The City of Oxnard HOME-ARP Allocation Plan describes how the City intends to distribute HOME-ARP funds and address the needs of the qualifying populations. This Plan will be submitted to HUD as a substantial amendment to the Federal Fiscal Year 2021 Annual Action Plan for review and acceptance.

CONSULTATION

Summarize the consultation process:

The community outreach and engagement process for the HOME-ARP grant provided multiple opportunities for subject matter experts within the community, stakeholders, and organizations to assess the needs, gaps, and barriers relating to homeless preventative services. Consultation methods included a HOME-ARP summary webpage, stakeholder meetings, two online surveys in English, a public comment period of the City of Oxnard HOME-ARP Allocation Plan (AP), and a public hearing.

The City of Oxnard consulted with organizations and service providers to identify unmet needs and gaps in housing and service delivery systems, along with recommendations for funding. SURVEYS

During the consultation process, the City of Oxnard disseminated a community survey with a survey flyer in English and Spanish. The community survey flyer was included in the city's neighborhood newsletter packet which was distributed weekly to approximately 300 residents. The community survey and flyer were posted on the City website. Additionally, the survey was posted at the Oxnard Public Library, Housing Department and broadcasted on the public viewing local TV Channels 10/35. The City of Oxnard uses flyers and neighborhood newsletters to increase community awareness regarding initiatives occurring in the City. The survey asked residents to give feedback on how the City should use the HOME ARP grant, and to prioritize the most important needs regarding homelessness in Oxnard. Surveys and comments were accepted from December 21, 2022, to –March 21, 2023. Responses were received from thirteen (13) interested community members.

CONSULTATION MEETINGS

The City of Oxnard held a series of stakeholder meetings to obtain feedback and comments concerning homelessness in Oxnard and the opportunities HOME ARP grant could provide. The City held meetings and discussions with the Ventura Continuum of Care, non-profit providers of supportive services, and community members in Oxnard.

In addition to the meetings the City engaged in dialog with Oxnard Housing Authority regarding HOME-ARP and discussed their perspective on HOME-ARP relative to housing needs. The Housing Authority supports the City's application for HOME ARP funding and recommended using the grant to construct affordable housing developments. The City also consulted with the Housing Rights Center to discuss methods of incorporating a fair housing focus when leasing up HOME-ARP housing units. The City of Oxnard currently contracts with the Housing Rights Center to conduct fair housing training and other services for Oxnard residents and City staff. Discussions centered on ways for potential HOME-ARP tenants to receive fair housing training and other assistance, as needed.

Letters of support were received from the Oxnard Housing Authority, and the Ventura County Continuum of Care.

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

Describe the public participation process, including information about and the dates of the public comment period and public hearing(s) held during the development of the Plan:

In accordance with the requirements for public participation for the HOME ARP, and the City of Oxnard Citizen Participation Plan, The City of Oxnard held two public hearings and one community meeting to solicit public comment regarding the HOME-ARP Substantial Amendment of the 2021 Annual Action Plan.

The City of Oxnard held an administrative public hearing on December 15, 2021, to receive public comments on the HOME- ARP goals and funding priorities. The Public Notices of public hearing was published on November 11, 2021, in the Ventura County VIDA newspaper in English and Spanish, posted on the City website, Housing Department, Library, and the City Clerk's office. The public hearing notices, also in English and Spanish, were included in the neighborhood weekly packets and distributed weekly prior to the Hearing to approximately 300 residents and broadcasted on the public viewing local TV channel 10/35. The public comment period begam December 15, 2021, and ended on February 3, 2022. During the public comment period, there were no written public comments submitted. One verbal public comment was received during the public hearing.

The Community Meeting was held January 11, 2023, at the Oxnard Public Library. The Community meeting was held in the evening, to allow residents and stakeholders to have the greatest opportunity to participate. The Public Notices was published on December 27, 2022, in the Ventura County Star newspaper in English and Spanish. The public notice and community meeting flyer were posted on the City of Oxnard website, Housing Department, Library, and the City Clerk's office. The public notice and community meeting flyer in the neighborhood weekly packets and distributed prior to the Meeting to approximately 300 residents and broadcasted on the public viewing local TV channel 10/35. The flyers were available in English and Spanish.

The Draft 2021 Annual Action Plan Amendment for the HOME-ARP Allocation Plan was made available for public review and comment from February 17, 2023, to March 21, 2023. While the HOME-ARP requirements only require a 15-day comment period, The City of Oxnard made the draft HOME ARP Allocation Plan Available for 30 days for public review. The public review and comment period began February 17, 2023, and ended on March 21, 2023.

The City of Oxnard held a public hearing on March 21, 2023, to receive comments on the draft 2021 Annual Action Plan Amendment for the HOME- ARP Allocation Plan prior to adoption by the City Council. The Public Notice of public hearing and public comment period were published on February 16, 2023, in the Ventura County VIDA newspaper in English and Spanish, posted on the City website, Housing Department, Library, and the City Clerk's office. The public hearing notices in English and Spanish were included in the Neighborhood weekly packets which were distributed weekly prior to the Hearing to approximately 300 residents and broadcasted on the public viewing local TV channel 10/35. The public comment period started February 17, 2023, and ended on March 21, 2023.

The Public meetings and public hearings were held and conducted in accordance with 24 CFR Part 91 and the City's Citizen Participation Plan. Stakeholder input was recorded and incorporated into the HOME ARP Allocation Plan. Concurrently the City solicited public feedback through newspapers, official governmental websites, and an online survey. These meetings were conducted to ensure inclusion of all residents of the region, target areas, beneficiaries of federal resources awarded through the public awards process, and public and private agencies operating in the City. The Public Hearings and meetings are in compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act. If the public requires special assistance to participate in a meeting, the individual could contact the City Clerk's Office or department, notated on the agenda. Notice at least 72 hours prior to the meeting will enable the City to reasonably arrange for persons accessibility to the meeting, notifications are reflected on the meeting agenda.

Describe any efforts to broaden public participation:

Outreach activities included community and stakeholder engagement opportunities that were promoted by the City of Oxnard and its community partners. Methods of engagement focused on creating occasions to participate in surveys available online; stakeholder, organization, and individual focus group meetings; public hearings; and public comment of the Draft City of Oxnard HOME-ARP Allocation Plan, proposed budget, and activities. To broaden public participation, all correspondence including surveys and public notices were posted at the Housing Department, Library, the City Clerk's office and online on the city's website.

SURVEYS AND NEIGHBORHOOD NEWSLETTERS

During the consultation process, the City of Oxnard distributed a community survey using a survey flyer in English and Spanish. The survey flyer was distributed weekly in the City's neighborhood packet to approximately 300 Oxnard residents. The City of Oxnard uses flyers and neighborhood newsletters to increase community awareness regarding initiatives occurring in the City. The survey asked residents to give feedback on how the City should use the HOME ARP grant, and to prioritize the most pressing needs regarding homelessness in Oxnard. Surveys and comments were accepted from December 2022-March 2023.

CONSULTATION MEETINGS

The City of Oxnard held a series of Stakeholder meetings to obtain feedback and comments concerning homelessness in Oxnard and the opportunities HOME ARP grant could provide. The City held meetings and discussions with the Ventura Continuum of Care, non-profit providers of supportive services, and community members in Oxnard.

In addition to the meetings the City engaged in dialog with Oxnard Housing Authority regarding HOME-ARP and discussed their perspective on HOME-ARP relative to Housing. The Housing Authority supports the City's application for HOME ARP funding and recommended using the grant to construct affordable housing. In addition to the Letter of Support from the Oxnard Housing Authority, they received a letter of support from the Ventura Continuum of Care.

Summarize the comments and recommendations received through the public participation process:

Because the City of Oxnard has a lack of interim housing for all qualifying populations, comments focused on the need for more affordable housing, supportive services, and additional non-congregate shelters.

The community expressed concern and frustration about the increased number of people experiencing homelessness in the City of Oxnard. Most survey participants, public forum speakers and other stakeholders identified a lack of available affordable housing as the primary cause of increased homelessness. They also identified constructing additional affordable housing for HOME ARP QPs as a solution to the homelessness issue in the City. Below are comments submitted by the community.

"The homeless issue is at a critical level. There is a huge encampment near 5th Street and Harbor with hundreds of homeless people living there. Fires frequently break out there, posing a great risk to nearby homes. There is a steady stream of homeless people walking behind the houses on Canal Street. The start of an encampment is now directly behind our house at 1040 Canal Street. These encampments pose a huge safety issue for many, many reasons - fires and criminal activity are only a couple of them. It is also a humanitarian issue and a financial issue, as property values plummet with homeless camps nearby."

"I don't know the answer to ending homelessness. But I hate waking up every night to the smell of burning trash and living with the threat of their fires getting out of control. It's also dangerous having wandering homeless people along Harbor Blvd, especially since the city prefers to ignore residents' requests to reduce the speed and install a traffic signal or stop sign."

"The best, long-term solution is funding the creating of deed-restricted housing. Affordable housing funds such as HOME-ARP should be used to fund affordable housing developments."

"In order of importance, I rate the following: 1. constructing affordable housing for homeless households. 2. Supportive Services for homeless households 3. Rental Assistance for homeless households. 4. Purchase and construction of homeless shelter with private space. While there is no doubting the necessity for homeless shelters, if more affordable housing options for those who are homeless were accessible, along with supportive services, more people would have a place to call home rather than a transient haven of solitude."

"Shelters are a Band-Aid to the homeless crisis. We need to focus on long-term goals. Tiny homes could be used as a temporary and long-term solution. As, affordable housing with supportive services are utilized to maintain housing security. Financial assistance also enables clients to achieve housing in the private sector including the supportive services needed to achieve and maintain permanent housing.

Create laws against large corporations from buying rental units or creating fair market rates in which corporations can rent the units. Build more affordable housing with less criteria to obtain a unit."

"Many of the people that we see who are displaced and need emergency shelter and longer than 1 or 2 nights. The LGBTQ+ community, and most especially our transgender population, are served best with a private space, including a private bathroom and shower. There needs to be some sort of plan in place that not only provides short term shelter but offers a way for the homeless to gain income so they can eventually get back on their feet."

"Affordable housing is the end solution to homelessness, so it is needed. However, for homeless persons to prepare to be successful in housing and stay housed they need support services such as mental health services, employment assistance and substance use services. These services are critical in addressing barriers and challenges that contributed to their homelessness. These two activities are equally important and go hand in hand. Providing financial assistance to individuals to help them afford rental units is another strategy that is needed. Homelessness is a complicated issue and will only be solved by a multi-faceted strategy with several activities. Implement an array of housing options, temporary, transitional, permanent supported, permanent, financial assistance for rents and related expenses as well as supportive services. Services are critical for success in solving homelessness. Without the services the housing will not be fully utilized to the maximum benefit and the crisis will persist."

"I believe there's a lot of elderly homeless that need a place to stay their last days here on earth, but we need to honor them and make sure that it's a place where they don't have to go out and look for work and struggle in their last years of life. Maybe churches could get involved in this. Families need to be our next priority because they are building our future in their children and if they don't have a good start, we're not going to have a very good future. Is very difficult to see women out on the streets alone with no one to go to, and no support. That is why domestic violence is in the same place. It's very hard to put veterans and disabled adults in order; there's a need for both, however, veterans do have another outlet the elderly do not have because they're not veterans. I believe rehabilitation companies are taking care of the homeless with substance use disorders because when you go into a rehabilitation center, it will cure and give you the steps you need to get out of homelessness. The chronically homeless are very difficult. And sex offenders are really the outliers here."

"Oxnard has a large homeless population and many of those who are in this situation need more than shelter but additional support services."

NEEDS ASSESSMENT AND GAP ANALYSIS

Describe the size and demographic composition of qualifying populations within the PJ's boundaries:

Homeless

City of Oxnard Homeless Statistics

The 2022 Homeless PIT count found 793 homeless individuals in Oxnard. Of the total homeless persons in Oxnard, 330 were sheltered homeless and 443 were unsheltered. Unsheltered homeless are those who were found to live in locations not meant for human habitation. Approximately 73% of the unsheltered homeless reported sleeping outdoors and 23% were in vehicles, the remainder reported sleeping in abandoned buildings. Of the total sheltered homeless counted, 96% (318) were in emergency shelter and (12) were in transitional housing. The City of Oxnard is one of the cities in Ventura County Continuum of Care and has the largest number of homeless persons, in the County. Approximately 35% of the homeless population in Ventura County was counted in the City of Oxnard.

The 2022 Homeless Count of unsheltered homeless identified 300 Non-Hispanic White persons, 296 Latino persons and Black persons in Oxnard. Of the total, there were 166 chronically homeless persons and 18 veterans.

Ventura County Homeless

According to the 2022 Point in Time Count, there were 2,238 homeless persons in Ventura County. Of the total counted, approximately 61% (1,356 persons) were unsheltered and 39% (882 persons) were sheltered. The majority of the unsheltered homeless were adults (1,350 persons); the remainder (6) were children under 18. The homeless in Ventura County is predominately White, representing 78% of the population. The 2022 Homeless Count identified 91 (7%) Black persons and 138 (10%) persons of multiple or other races. The remaining five percent were Asian, Native American, or Pacific Islanders. Latinos make up 50% of the unsheltered homeless in Ventura County.

Approximately 83% of the homeless are adults aged 25-61, five percent are under the age of 25. In addition, there were 629 chronically homeless persons, 71 veterans, 62 transitional age youth (18-24 years old), and 149 seniors (age 62+) were counted.

For the purposes of this analysis, data was provided for Ventura County and the City of Oxnard. It is important to consider the impact of homeless conditions in Oxnard from a countywide perspective.

Although Point-In-Time counts are widely used to estimate the homeless population of an area, the data represents a one-day count of the homeless. The results can be affected by factors including weather, resources, and methodologies; therefore, numbers may understate the true extent of homelessness.

At-risk of Homelessness

According to HUD, persons at greatest risk of housing instability are those: 1) earning 30% or below the HAMFI and are severely cost-burdened (paying 50% or more on housing); or 2) are earning 50% or less of HAMFI and meet one of the following conditions:

- Has moved two or more times in the two months immediately preceding their application for homelessness prevention assistance.
- Is living in the home of another because of economic hardship.
- Has been formally notified of eviction within 21 days after the date of application for assistance.
- Lives in a hotel or motel and the cost of staying at the hotel or motel is not borne by a federal, state, or local government program.
- Lives in an over-crowded (more than one person per room) single-room occupancy (SRO) or efficiency apartment units or lives in a severely overcrowded (more than 1.5 persons per room) larger housing unit.
- Is exiting a publicly funded institution, or system of care (health care facility, mental health facility, foster care or other youth facility, or correction program or institution).
- Increased risk of homelessness, as identified in the recipient's approved Consolidated Plan.

According to the 2015-2019 Chas Data here were households in Oxnard. Of the total households, approximately 11,875 (23%) were classified as low-income households, meaning their total household income was less than 80% of AMI for the Oxnard Area. Households with lower incomes have an increased risk of homelessness, especially households with incomes at or below 30% of Area Median income. Extremely low-income (ELI) households (<30% AMI) comprise thirteen (13) percent (6,849) of Oxnard 's households have significant housing needs. According to the CHAS Data compiled by HUD, 28 percent of the City's ELI households are renters, a group particularly vulnerable to rising rents. Severely cost burdened households often must choose between paying for housing expenses or other necessities such as food, transportation, medication, and other needs.

Living in overcrowded conditions was identified as a significant housing problem in Oxnard. Of the total renter occupied households in the City, approximately 74% percent were living in overcrowded conditions (more than 1 person per room), of the Total renters 6,269 were living in severely overcrowded conditions. while percent of total owner-occupied households were living under these conditions. Oxnard also has larger average household sizes than Ventura County. The 2020 Census Bureau data noted that 9.1% or approximately 76,790 of the 843,843 residents of the County were living below the poverty level. These persons are at risk of becoming homeless. Many of these persons can become homeless because of social structural issues such as increases in rent, loss of job, and rising health care costs. In addition, personal experiences such as domestic violence, physical disabilities, mental illness, and substance abuse can cause members of a low-income household or an entire household to become homeless.

Fleeing, Attempting to Flee DV, SA, Stalking or Human Trafficking

The U.S. Center for Disease Control's National Intimate Partner and Sexual Violence Survey (2015) found 43.6 percent of women (nearly 52.2 million) in the U.S. experienced some form of contact sexual violence in their lifetime, with 4.7 percent of women experiencing this violence in the 12 months preceding the survey. Social service agencies assisting victims of domestic violence, spousal abuse indicate increased over the past 10 years. Immigrant women are particularly vulnerable to abuse and are reluctant to report incidences or seek assistance. The National Network to End Domestic Violence found:

- Domestic violence is the leading cause of homelessness for women and children.
- Over 90 percent of homeless women have experienced severe physical or sexual violence at some point in their lives, and 63 percent have been victims of intimate partner violence as adults.
- Over 80 percent of survivors entering shelters identified "finding housing I can afford" as a need second only to "safety for myself."

According to the 2022 Point-In-Time Homeless Count for Ventura County, 130 are homeless because of domestic violence or intimate partner violence. Of these homeless, 41 were from Oxnard. The immediate housing needs of victims of domestic violence relate to shelter and transitional housing. The count of sheltered persons in domestic violence shelters, revealed there were 29 in shelter at the time of the 2022 Homeless Count.

The State of California Department of Justice data found there were 1,952 calls for service in 2021 from victims of domestic violence in Oxnard. Human Trafficking data was also examined. According to the most current data from the Human Trafficking Institute, from 2015-2020 there were 155 human trafficking cases in the state of California. For the purposes of this report, the data counted cases from adult and child victims and didn't separate forced labor cases from assault cases.

Other Populations at Greater Risk of Housing Instability

Persons with Disabilities - A disability is defined as a long-lasting physical, mental, or emotional condition that impairs an individual's mobility, ability to work, or ability for self-care. The special housing needs of disabled persons result from limited, often fixed incomes; shortage of accessible housing; and higher health care costs associated with the disability.

According to the ACS 2018 data, Ten percent (10 %) of Oxnard 's population has some type of disability, and of the total disabled population (20,804), 17 percent were employed, and 40 percent were seniors. In addition to persons with other disabilities, 2019 DDS data reveals there are over Oxnard residents with developmental disabilities, with approximately two-thirds under the age of 18. The available data reveals, over 80 percent of persons with developmental disabilities reside with of parents, families, or guardians.

Elderly - According to the ACS 2018 data, Ten percent (10 %) of Oxnard 's population has some type of disability, and of the total disabled population (20,804), 17 percent were employed, and 40 percent were seniors. In addition to persons with other disabilities, 2019 DDS data reveals there are over 2,600 Oxnard residents with developmental disabilities, with approximately 60 percent under the age of 18. The available data reveals over 80 percent of persons with developmental disabilities reside with of parents, families, or guardians.

Female-Headed Households - Female-headed households with children tend to have lower incomes, which limits their housing options and access to supportive services. The Census ACS 2014-2018 data estimates 9,563 female-headed households in Oxnard and 15 percent of these households had a related child under the age of 18. Female headed households with children have an increased risk of living in poverty are at risk of homelessness.

Veterans and Families that include a Veteran Family Member

As defined by HUD, Veterans and Families that include a Veteran Family Member that meets the criteria for one of the qualifying populations described are eligible to receive HOME-ARP assistance.

According to the 2022 Homeless Count, there were 71 unsheltered homeless veterans counted in Ventura County. Approximately 18 were in Oxnard. Demographic data regarding race was available for the sheltered homeless. There were 49 sheltered homeless veterans identified in the 2022 Homeless Count. Approximately 44 experienced chronic homelessness in Ventura County. Of the total sheltered veterans 41 were White, three (3) Black, and five (5) of multiple races. Of the total sheltered veterans, 11 were Latino. The count also revealed there were 41 disabled, sheltered homeless veterans, representing 83% of the total sheltered veterans in Ventura County.

Identify and consider the current resources available to assist Qualifying Populations, including congregate and non-congregate shelter units, supportive services, TBRA, and affordable and permanent supportive rental housing

The County of Ventura (County) and Ventura County Continuum of Care (CoC) are the lead homeless service providers and funders of homeless services within the County Ventura, which includes the City of Oxnard. Both the County and CoC annually commit millions of dollars to support the homeless, those atrisk of becoming homeless and other special populations through congregate and non-congregate shelters, rental assistance, supportive services and affordable housing.

The City of Oxnard is an active member of the CoC and supports their efforts to align and allocate resources and set policies that shape the way homeless are served in Ventura County.

The City of Oxnard is committed to addressing homelessness and continues to commit local and state funding, along with its federal resources such as CDBG, HOME, ESG and Section 8 Vouchers to assist families or individuals experiencing homelessness, at-risk of becoming homeless and HOME – ARP qualifying populations. The resources the City of Oxnard commits support the operation of shelters, street outreach, rental assistance, supportive services and the development of affordable housing.

The City's Homeless Coordinator works closely with the Salvation Army, the City's contracted outreach team, to engage the homeless and qualifying populations to assist them with navigating the homeless system and linking them to either City sponsored programs or the larger County System of Care. A list of existing programs is provided in the appendix for reference.

Describe the unmet housing and service needs of the qualifying populations.

<u>Homeless</u>

The Ventura County Continuum of Care Housing Inventory indicates there are 2.313 beds/units to assist homeless persons in Ventura County. Point in time data also revealed 91% units or beds were near or at full capacity at the time of the 2022 Homeless count, indicating an inadequate supply of shelter beds, interim housing, and permanent supportive housing for homeless throughout Ventura County. The permanent supportive housing (PSH) is filled, except for a few HUD VASH beds/units.

The Ventura Continuum of Care reported receiving 3,114 calls for housing assistance in 2021. Approximately 40% (1,244) of all calls came from Oxnard. Of the total calls received, 834 came from currently homeless persons in Oxnard in need of housing assistance. The County of Ventura Healthcare for the Homeless reported 12,093 persons enrolled that met the Health Resources & Services Administration (HRSA) definition of homeless (includes doubled up and at-risk persons). Of this number, approximately 30% of persons (3,627) were literally homeless (on the streets, emergency shelter or transitional housing). In addition, The Ventura County Office of Education tracks the number homeless students in public schools based on the Federal Department of Education definition of homelessness (includes doubled up and at-risk persons). During the 2022 school year 4,456 students were considered homeless, Of this total, approximately 449 were literally homeless (as defined by HUD).

The data reveals there are 834 literally homeless persons seeking housing assistance through the continuum of care, when considering the additional literally homeless from the other programs, it further compounds the unmet need for suitable housing.

At-Risk of Homelessness

The Ventura County Continuum of Care homeless services system saw 3,770 persons, including. 2,849 single adults and 921 persons in families, including 558 children. A total of 2,750 referrals were made to programs including homeless prevention assistance, emergency shelter, transitional housing, rapid re-housing, and permanent supportive housing. During 2021, Ventura County 2-1-1 continued to see increased calls for housing assistance which resulted in the top unmet need category.

In addition, the Ventura Continuum of Care reported receiving 3,114 calls for housing assistance in 2021. Approximately 40% (1,244) of all calls came from Oxnard. Of the total calls received, 410 came from persons at risk of homelessness in Oxnard in need of housing assistance.

The County of Ventura Healthcare for the Homeless reported 12,093 persons enrolled that met the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) definition of homeless (includes doubled up and at-risk persons). In addition, The Ventura County Office of Education tracks the number homeless students in public schools based on the Federal Department of Education definition of homelessness (includes doubled up and at-risk persons). During the 2022 school year 4,456 students were considered homeless in Ventura County.

Other groups at risk of homelessness include very low and extremely low-income households paying 50% more of their income on housing costs. This also greatly impacts female-headed households and persons in overcrowded housing conditions. The Oxnard Housing Element revealed there are 11,580 very low and extremely low, severely cost burdened households. They are paying more than 30% of their income on housing. The City's Regional Housing Needs study found the City of Oxnard needs to provide their share of 8,500 affordable housing units by 2029. Of the total, 6,420 are needed to build affordable housing for Oxnard's lower income households.

Persons Fleeing DV, Stalking Human Trafficking, and Veterans

While the Ventura County Continuum of Care has some shelter options for domestic violence survivors and veterans, the units available are typically not permeant housing. The limited number of transitional units Oxnard available for persons fleeing domestic violence is not enough to permanently house 130 persons who are homeless due to domestic violence. It also does not keep pace with the 155 human trafficking victims in the State of California. At the time of the 2022 Homeless Count approximately 91% of the beds/units were at capacity.

Despite the housing services and other benefits available through HUD and Veterans Affairs, some qualifying Veterans (e.g., those honorably discharged) do not pursue these opportunities for a variety of reasons. Many of the reasons for homelessness stem from long-term health issues, as well as an overall lack of affordable housing (particularly for those Veterans with families) and other barriers such as poor credit and criminal backgrounds.

Those requiring services or assistance to prevent homelessness or housing instability

The provision of enough affordable housing units is the most important factor in promoting housing stability. The City of Oxnard lacks enough affordable housing, for lower income individuals and families. Nearly every group with special housing needs has limited financial resources for housing. The Oxnard Housing element data reveals, the City needs to construct 8,500 affordable housing units by 2029, in accordance with its Regional Housing Goals. The units needed are only expected to increase in the future.

Identify any gaps within the current shelter and housing inventory as well as the service delivery system:

According to the 2022 Continuum of Care Housing Inventory Report, There are 805 emergency shelter beds, 10 haven beds, 191 transitional housing beds, 689 permanent supportive beds, and 516 rapid-rehousing beds. In addition, there are 73 other supportive units provided through the Oxnard Public housing authority (67 vouchers) and Ventura County Human Services Agency (6 beds). The 2022 Continuum of Care Housing Inventory revealed 91 percent of their available beds/units were at capacity at the time of the 2022 point and time count. It is also important to note the beds are meant for persons within the entire service are for the Ventura County Continuum of Care. Of the total homeless counted in Ventura County, 40% were counted in Oxnard. In addition, agencies serving the homeless and area developers identified a need for affordable housing. Housing is needed to serve the homeless population and people at risk of becoming homeless. Permanent Housing options were identified as the best way to reduce homelessness, along with having necessary supportive services. The 2022 Inventory for the

Continuum, along with the report shelter occupancy rates during the point and time count and survey data are in the appendix.

Identify the characteristics of housing associated with instability and an increased risk of homelessness if the PJ will include such conditions in its definition of "other populations" as established in the HOME-ARP Notice:

The City of Oxnard will use HOME ARP to assist other populations at risk of housing instability. Factors the City will consider include low income, cost burdened renters, the elderly, persons with disabilities, as well as those living in overcrowded housing conditions.

Identify priority needs for qualifying populations:

Overall Top Priorities

There is an overall need for affordable permanent supportive housing in Oxnard. The data and feedback from stakeholders held that providing permanent supportive housing was the most effective way to address homelessness in Oxnard. The construction of housing of additional affordable units would help provide relief to an overwhelmed homeless services system. Following housing, stakeholders identified the need for supportive services.

Explain how the level of need and gaps in its shelter and housing inventory and service delivery systems based on the data presented in the plan were determined:

The needs and gaps in the shelter and housing inventory and service delivery systems included in this plan were identified through data from several sources, including stakeholder meetings, surveys, public engagement, and various studies and reports. A list of all the sources cited in this plan is included in the appendix.

HOME-ARP ACTIVITIES

Describe the method for soliciting applications for funding and/or selecting developers, service providers, sub-recipients and/or contractors and whether the PJ will administer eligible activities directly:

The City is working on numerous affordable rental housing and permanent supportive housing projects that are in different stages of development. Some projects are early in the conceptual and land assemblage phase, while other projects have been fully entitled and in the process of obtaining financing. Many of these projects include a unit set aside to serve HOME-ARP qualifying populations. However, because none of these projects have been approved by the City Council, staff cannot identify specific HOME ARP project(s) at this time.

Pending HUD approval of its HOME-ARP Allocation Plan, the City will issue a Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA) for interested and experienced service providers and developers of permanent supportive housing and affordable multifamily housing in accordance with City procurement procedures.

Once the solicitation process is completed, projects will be recommended to the City Council for approval and HOME – ARP funding commitment.

The City of Oxnard intends to administer the HOME-ARP program internally. No subrecipients or subcontractors will administer the Oxnard HOME-ARP program.

If any portion of the PJ's HOME-ARP administrative funds were provided to a subrecipient or contractor prior to HUD's acceptance of the HOME-ARP allocation plan because the sub-recipient or contractor is responsible for the administration of the PJ's entire HOME-ARP grant, identify the sub-recipient or contractor and describe its role and responsibilities in administering all of the PJ's HOME-ARP program:

The City of Oxnard anticipates using up to five percent of HOME- ARP HOME administration funds prior to HUD acceptance of the allocation Plan for administration and planning of the program. The City anticipates administering HOME ARP internally. No subrecipients or contractors will administer the Oxnard HOME ARP program.

HOME-ARP Budget

Describe how the PJ will distribute HOME-ARP funds in accordance with its priority needs identified in its needs assessment and gap analysis:

There is an overall need for affordable housing in Oxnard. The data and feedback from stakeholders held that providing permanent supportive housing was the most effective way to address homelessness in Oxnard. The construction of housing of additional affordable units would help provide relief to an overwhelmed homeless services system. Following housing, stakeholders identified the need for supportive services.

The City of Oxnard believes by expanding the development of affordable rental housing it will be able to assist all qualified populations by providing longer term affordable housing opportunities. The expansion will allow for a space for currently fleeing, or attempting to flee, domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, stalking, or human trafficking individuals or families, veterans, those currently facing homelessness and those at risk of homelessness. The City of Oxnard intends to allocate its HOME-ARP funds to the Development of Affordable Rental Housing, which may include contributions of capital and/or operating subsidies for the purpose of quickly creating and supporting new units of affordable housing for priority Qualifying Populations.

Describe how the characteristics of the shelter and housing inventory, service delivery system, and the needs identified in the gap analysis provided a rationale for the plan to fund eligible activities:

HOME ARP qualifying populations require a wide range of services and support to remain housed. The highest priority needs, which were consistently identified through consultations and reinforced with the data describing the lack of units available to the extremely low-income population along with the lack of available shelter bed were increasing the supply of affordable rental housing units. The City of Oxnard needs affordable housing and other options to address homelessness. Production of affordable housing was identified as the best method to address homelessness, long term for the City. Each unit developed will help an overburdened homeless service delivery system. It's most needed for Oxnard, because the largest share of homeless persons in Ventura County (sheltered and unsheltered) are in the city.

HOME-ARP Production Housing Goals

Estimate the number of affordable rental housing units for qualifying populations that the PJ will produce or support with its HOME-ARP allocation:

The exact number of units that will be created with HOME-ARP funds will depend on several factors, including but not limited to construction type and cost; type of HOME-ARP assistance requested (e.g., capital, or operating subsidy); availability of other subsidies; and cost of land. It is estimated that the City's HOME-ARP allocation will result in 20 new affordable housing units for Qualifying Populations. This estimate of 20 units is based upon the City of Oxnard's previous experience of supporting permanent supportive housing for persons experiencing homelessness. Developments that house homeless households are very expensive and tend to require a rental subsidy, like a project-based voucher (PBV) to offset the low rents yet make the project financially feasible. The City does not have vouchers to the project base, therefore, based on our experience we anticipate being able to support the development of approximately 20 permanent supportive housing units The actual project(s) may result in a different final unit count.

The HOME-ARP units will help the City to reduce homelessness and will help address the City's need to produce 8,500 units of affordable housing by 2029 in accordance with the City's Regional Affordable Housing requirements. The City of Oxnard's Housing Element specifically calls for considerations to produce affordable housing for vulnerable populations, which includes the HOME-ARP QPs.

Describe the specific affordable rental housing production goal that the PJ hopes to achieve and describe how it will address the PJ's priority needs:

The City of Oxnard anticipates projects will be primarily funded with HOME ARP funds. The estimated units to be created with HOME ARP funds will increase the number of housing units available to serve Qualifying Populations, with preferences for households experiencing homelessness, those at risk of homelessness, and persons with high risk of housing instability in our community.

PREFERENCES

Identify whether the PJ intends to give preference to one or more qualifying populations or a subpopulation within one or more qualifying populations for any eligible activity or project:

The City of Oxnard intends to serve all HOME-ARP Qualifying populations. The resulting housing units will be available to the homeless, at risk of homeless, persons fleeing or attempting to flee domestic violence, stalking, or human trafficking as well as other populations at great risk of housing instability. The City has a need to serve these populations, as the Gap and needs analysis revealed the City has the highest total number of homeless counts in Ventura County.

Pending HUD approval of its HOME-ARP Allocation Plan, the City will issue a Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA) for interested and experienced developers of permanent supportive housing. As a best practice and as suggested in the HOME-ARP guidance, the City will require developers to accept referrals from individuals and families that meet the HOME-ARP qualifying populations, via the Ventura County Continuum of Care (CoC) Coordinated Entry System, (expanded to include HOME-ARP QPs). The City's Housing Coordinator, in partnership with its outreach contractors, will continue to engage all HOME-ARP qualifying populations, to ensure they are being assessed and placed into the Coordinated Entry System for housing opportunities.

If a preference was identified, explain how the use of a preference or method of prioritization will address the unmet need or gap in benefits and services received by individuals and families in the qualifying population or category of qualifying population, consistent with the PJ's needs assessment and gap analysis:

The City of Oxnard intends to partner with the Continuum of Care of Ventura County to make and receive HOME-ARP referrals through an expanded Coordinated Entry System. Additional coordination and outreach will also come from the City's Housing Coordinator. Coordinated entry will help the City to house the QPs with the highest needs to reduce homelessness and provide permanent affordable housing in Oxnard.

If a preference was identified, describe how the PJ will use HOME-ARP funds to address the unmet needs or gaps in benefits and services of the other qualifying populations that are not included in the preference:

The City of Oxnard intends to make the HOME-ARP program available to eligible all HOME-ARP qualifying populations. Homeless, At Risk of Homeless, Persons fleeing or attempting to flee domestic violence, stalking or human trafficking or Other populations with great risk of housing instability.

RECOMMENDATION

That City Council approve the following actions:

1. Authorize the City Manager to accept funds through the HOME American Rescue Plan provided by the Department of Housing and Urban Development;

2. Authorize the City Manager to execute the HOME ARP Grant Agreement by and between the City of Oxnard and the Department of Housing and Urban Development for the use of \$2,772,021; and

3. Direct staff to return to the City Council with a 2021-2022 Annual Action Plan amendment that includes proposed activities and a Funding Allocation Plan for the HOME ARP program once the compliance documentation has been completed.

BACKGROUND

The HOME ARP is a new funding source from the Federal government for local and state governments to address homeless needs. Congress appropriated \$5 billion dollars for the program, nationwide, with the City receiving \$2,772,021.

The funds must specifically target homelessness and provide services to the following qualifying populations as defined by McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act: 1) Homeless as defined in the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) Title 24 CFR 91.5; 2) Those At-Risk of Homelessness, as defined in the CFR, Title 24 CFR 91.5; 3) Those Fleeing or Attempting to Flee Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, or Sexual Assault, Stalking or Human Trafficking, as defined by HUD; and, 4) Other Populations where providing supportive services or assistance would prevent homelessness or those with the greatest risk of housing instability. Additionally, Veterans that include a family member are eligible to receive services under this program as long as they meet one of the four qualifying populations criteria previously mentioned.

The HOME ARP program allows the City up to fifteen percent for administrative and planning activities throughout the total period the funds are available (through September 2030). Five percent of the fifteen percent administrative funds can be used immediately to create a HOME ARP allocation plan and amendment to the 2021-2022 Annual Action Plan. Once the allocation plan is complete and submitted to HUD, the City will be able to access the remaining ninety-five percent of the grant and execute the program.

Examples of uses of the funds include: non-congregate shelters; the construction, acquisition and rehabilitation of rental housing for purposes such as permanent supportive housing; non-profit operating and capacity-building assistance to non-profits and homeless providers; support services such as homeless prevention programs; housing counseling; and tenant-based rental assistance.

DISCUSSION

On December 15, 2021, the Housing Department had the first Administrative Public Hearing for the Annual Action Plan. This citizen engagement process, prompts discussions with residents and stakeholders on activities that CDBG, HOME, ESG, CARES Act, and HOME ARP programs should consider, given what the programs can offer, and where the need and priorities are for the up-and-coming fiscal year. A second public hearing is tentatively scheduled for May 2022, which the intent to submit the Annual Action Plan to HUD by May 31, 2022. Once the plan is submitted the remaining 95% of the HOME ARP funding will become available for the selected programs.

STRATEGIC PRIORITIES

This agenda item supports the Quality of Life strategy, which seeks to address homelessness in Oxnard.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

The funding received will increase financial resources for housing the homeless and supportive services. There is no funding match requirement, as there is in the regular HOME program, therefore no additional funding is required by the City's general fund. All ARP funding must be used by September 30, 2030.

This item is routine in nature and therefore, this item did not originate in Committee.

Homeless Needs Survey-Housing Developers (Oxnard)






